Chairman John Wood Writes:

Councillor Steve Lyons would like to thank all the volunteers who turned out on Sunday 5th November to help with the Collingbourne Ducis village litter pick. The team got lucky with the weather as the village was bathed in sunshine for the duration. A total of thirteen bags of rubbish were collected from around the village, which included a car exhaust. Special thanks go to the Tipple Inn for providing the refreshments for the team on completion. The

Village Steward continues to be active in the village clearing pathways and alleyways and can be tasked by using the form on the village website. The next village event is the Collingbourne Ducis Christmas Brunch which will take place at 10 am on the morning of Sunday the 10th December in the Village Hall. There will be a face painter, balloon sculpture and a raffle, along with the usual teas, coffees, and brunch. Please come and join us for a get together in the lead up to Christmas, all are welcome.

We are actively looking for willing volunteers to join the Speed Watch team. If you feel you want to contribute to the traffic calming effort now is a good time to complete the training, please contact the Parish Clerk for details. The more observant of you will have noticed that the virtual footpath on the Cadley Road has at last been repainted and at the last Council meeting in October the subject of the overweight HGVs using the Ludgershall Road was discussed. The advice from Wiltshire Councils representative, Councillor Chris Williams is to photograph the offending vehicles and forward them to the Police who will take the appropriate action.

There have recently been a number of senseless acts of vandalism in the village which have included the smashing of windows in the

village bus shelters and more recently damage to ornaments that had been left on a child's grave in the Burial Ground. The local area Police have been made aware of these incidents. Please remain ever vigilant and if you witness any form of vandalism, please do not hesitate to contact the Police and or the Parish Council through the Parish Clerk. The windows in the bus shelters can and will be replaced, the psychological effects caused by the damage to the ornaments on a grave will prove more difficult.

COLLINGBOURNE KINGSTON PARISH COUNCIL

Richard Semple, Chairman, writes:

I write this update as we have just commemorated Remembrance Day at St



Andrew's Church, Collingbourne Ducis, as well as admiring the splash of red poppies against our spruced-up war memorial in Collingbourne Kingston. Reminders to us all how lucky we are to live in this peaceful corner of the Wiltshire countryside.

At our last Parish Council meeting, we took the opportunity to review the latest road traffic data, collected by our volunteer Community Speed-watch Team. The average number of vehicles speeding along the A338 through our village remains high at 7.8% as compared to an average figure of 3.2% across Wiltshire. Thanks to the vigilance of the Team, nearly four thousand letters have been issued by Wiltshire Police to speeding motorists, including a sizeable number to repeat offenders. The Police have also continued to run their own speed-traps, issuing penalties where appropriate. I am pleased to say that some of the worn out 30 mph signs have now been replaced with new legally compliant ones but unfortunately, our speed indicator device at Aughton has been stolen so we are in the process of getting it replaced. We also received an update on Wiltshire Council matters from Councillor Chris Williams, including a briefing on 'Warm and Safe Wiltshire', which I commend to you. This is a service provided by both Wiltshire and Swindon Councils, in partnership with the Centre for Sustainable Energy. It provides in-depth telephone support and home visits to help people save money on their gas and electricity bills, and to get funding for heating and insulation improvements in their homes. The help available includes free and impartial advice on:

- Understanding fuel bills and tips on simple ways to save energy and lower your bills
- Guidance on heating systems and controls
- Eligibility for heating and insulation grants and fuel vouchers
- Issues with damp and condensation
- Fuel debt advice
- Switching energy suppliers and fuel tariffs

- Signing up to the Priority Services Register
- Discounts and support with water bills

Cornish Heavy (Heava Cake)

Simon Gilford writes:

It's kind of an appropriate time to share this recipe, as we've just returned from a trip down to Cornwall to visit our daughter Emily. One of her friends shared this recipe with her and I've been given strict instructions not to share it further – so don't tell anyone, especially Emily. I have to say that based on the ingredients, I really

wasn't expecting much when I made it, but I was in for a surprise – it was delicious, even if I do say so myself. I used a 20cm x 18cm (5cm deep) lined brownie/roasting tin.

Ingredients:

500g self-raising flour.

250g unsalted butter (cold), cut into small chunks.

360g raisins (I used mixed fruit, which worked well).

180g caster sugar.

150ml milk.

Method:

- 1. Set your oven to 190C.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, rub the butter into the flour until it has the texture of fine breadcrumbs.
- 3. Add in the sugar and fruit and mix well. Add the milk and mix toa soft, stiff dough. You might need to add more milk a splash at a time if it is too thick.
- 4. Press into the lined tin, ensuring you push firmly into the corners. Smooth the surface with a wet palette knife. Score the top with a sharp knife diagonally to make a diamond pattern.
- 5. Bake on the middle shelf of the oven for 30-40 minutes, until it is golden brown and a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean.
- 6. Allow to cool (a little) and brush the surface with some milk and sprinkle with some sugar
- 7. Allow to cool, cut into large slices, and then eat cake!

I had butter on mine which made it even better.

Michael Caine and the late Glenda Jackson bring their A-games to this true-life heart warmer about the 89-year-old second world war Royal Naval Veteran Bernard Jordan, who in 2014 jauntily sneaked out of his seaside care home (where he lived with his wife Irene) on a secret mission to get aboard a cross-channel ferry and attend the 70th anniversary celebrations of the D-day landings in Normandy having failed to get included on an official group excursion. He was dubbed 'the great escaper' in the press.

Caine is Jordan, of course, bringing plenty of droll and lugubrious spark to the role, shuffling up and down the seafront, grumpily denouncing the trendy cyclists almost running him over on the pavement as 'tossers' and letting the air out of their tyres. But he is arguably upstaged by Jackson as Irene, or Rene, who is sarky and sardonic to everyone, including her care worker Adele (an excellent performance from Danielle Vitalis). There's a huge amount to enjoy from these legendary performers.

The Bourne community café, so named following a vote after a public questionnaire, has now been running for eight months on the second Saturday of each month. We were blessed with some great donations of two coffee machines from some lovely neighbours, numerous cups, mugs, tea towels, aprons, and tablecloths, for which we are very grateful. Beerfest gave us a donation of £400 to purchase a more advanced coffee machine and a thermal jug for Americano and flat white coffees. When we started, we were struggling with what the café should be, how it should work and where everyone would fit, but I'm pleased to say that those initial crinkles have been ironed out and I believe we now have the right structure and all of us work really well as a team. That's not to say that further suggestions wouldn't be welcomed and considered.

During this time, we have managed to have several themed months and a craft fayre. We've been through Easter and Wimbledon with the latest theme being Halloween with pumpkins adorning the tables and most recently Armistice Day with hand crocheted red and purple poppies scattered, we are also pleased that each month has seen seasonal flowers from our gardens, making it all very welcoming.

We now have banners announcing our opening Saturdays and this seems to have prompted a goodly attendance for October and November although this of course could be coincidence. We also offered soup for these months so that could have been the draw!

We have some very regular attendees, visitors and new village families – it is nice to see families bringing along their own weekend visitors as well. It has become a really comfortable and social space, and we are encouraged by those that stop and play the games provided and the children that partake of the crafts available.

I would like to say a huge thank you to all our regular volunteers, and the families they have dragged along with them, because as most of us know these things don't just happen, it takes more than turning up on a Saturday morning. 
I also need to thank you, the supporters, there would be no point in doing all of this unless there were people to serve, and we have made some new acquaintances and friends through doing it.

MINCE PIE RECIPE

Caroline Bouwens provides a seasonal recipe: Ingredients:

120g unsalted butter – chilled

180g plain flour

40g icing sugar

Salt

1 egg yolk

Mincemeat

2-3 tsp water

Eggwash (legg beaten with a splash of milk) for glazing

Method:

Place butter, flour, icing sugar and salt in a bowl and rub to fine breadcrumbs. You can also blitz in a mixer.

Add the egg yolk and water and mix to form a dough. Knead lightly and wrap in cellophane and put in fridge for an hour.

Take out and roll on a floured surface to 2-3mm thickness and cut out to suit your mince pie tin. Allow enough to make lids!

Fill with mincemeat, being careful not to overfill.

Brush the edges of the lids with eggwash and press gently into place.

Brush the mince pies with eggwash and make a hole tin the top with a small knife.

Bake at 200 C/gas mark 6 for 10 – 20 minutes depending on the size of your pies. Check regularly to prevent over cooking.

To serve – sprinkle with icing sugar.

Makes twelve generous mince pies.

Coincidence and Arrogance

I am aware that what we commemorate and look forward to at Christmas is something that has already changed the face of human nature. It is an ability to see the changes that sets us apart in our lives.

Whilst attending a funeral service recently we prepared the ashes plot to bury a man with his wife. Her name was Debbie, she liked wet and windy weather, and we interred her husband during storm Debra. An amusing coincidence making a casual connection between the three.

The mistake is to step from the casual to the causal. The 'expert' in Sally Clark's conviction spoke outside their area of competence to everyone's cost.

A friend was recently told that religion is a load of nonsense. The critic was speaking outside their area of competence. Most believers would love the certainty, but doubt is a virtue in a living faith that grows through challenges. Doubt is also consistent with logic and rational thought.

Belief is based on experience and logic. Belief seeded scientific method in our various cultures arose from a plethora of religious scholars. It never admits to certainty. It only admits to 'best explanation at the time.' Newton replaced Aristotle, Einstein replaced Newton and so forth. That inquiry-based scholarship drove the three wise men to Bethlehem and hopefully will drive us this season.
